

OPENING MESSAGE

Dear Community Members,

The 22/23 school year brought many challenges but also many great successes. Unlike recent years COVID-19 did not cause any closures however heavy snowfall forced multiple center closures in the month of February. Luckily, staff were prepared for these challenges by utilizing distance-learning models. Distance learning allowed teachers to connect with students through zoom and offer fun lessons and activities to do in the snow with their families. Homework packets were made available to help parents keep students entertained during the days they were snowed in. Staff turnover was another challenge the center faced this year with at least one position being vacant all year. The existing staff rose to the occasion by

covering teachers when necessary and working together to ensure our students had a positive learning experience.

One of our great successes this year has been the implementation of the Child Care Certificate Program. This program is funded through the Tribal Child Care Association of California (TCCAC) and has allowed us to



subsidize childcare for Native American children ages 6 weeks to 12 years old. The Child Care Certificate Program has been a welcomed addition to our program with continued growth and new enrollments every month.

As we continue to move forward together, we will continue to celebrate our successes and work on our needs as we help to inspire our staff, students and families to have growth in all situations. Our focus this year has been to our native traditions and culture, and our commitment to the well-being of children, families, staff, and our community while supporting Kindergarten Readiness Goals.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Redding Rancheria's Head Start and Child Care center has been in operation since 1995. Both the Head Start and Child Care programs are federally funded through the Office of Head Start and the Office of Child Care respectively. The program serves thirty-four (34) children in two Head Start classrooms. Seventeen (17) full time children attend the CCDF Child Care classroom on a sliding scale fee basis for low to moderate-income, working parents. These two grants funded programs complement each other and enable the Redding Rancheria to serve native families in our community. Both the Head Start and Child Care emphasize Native American culture, traditional values and prepare children for success in school by developing personalized school readiness goals.


As a result of planning, support services and collaboration from our stakeholders and federal partners, ongoing monitoring, and professional development, our programs achieve full compliance in the following areas:

- Child Development and Education
- Inclusion and Mental Health
- Parent, Family and Community Engagement

HIGHLIGHTS

- 100% of children served were Native American.
- Head Start- <u>32 children</u> and <u>38 families</u> were served.
- Head Start Vacancy- <u>2 Spots</u> (We were unable to fill the spots with income eligible students)
- Child Care- <u>17 children</u> and <u>26 families</u> were served.
- Child Care Certificate Program- <u>37 children</u> and <u>families</u> were served.
- The year-end wait list was <u>78 children</u>.
- The attendance percentage for Head Start Center based learning was 71%.
- The attendance percentage for Child Care center based learning was 72%.
- FY 2022 had parent and community volunteer hours valued at \$11,447.
- Every child received one new book per month as part of our Bookworm Club Literacy
 Program as well as a book on their birthday signed by all the staff.
- Teachers continue in CLASS Professional Development as well as continued education at Shasta College.



PROGRAM GOALS

Fall 2022-Spring 2023

LONG RANGE GOAL: Meet and exceed the Head Start Performance Standard of 85% monthly attendance to positively impact family awareness, behavior and school readiness.

OBJECTIVES:

1. ERSEA Staff will incentivize attendance by creating monthly attendance awards and educate parents on how attendance impacts school readiness.

PROGRESS: At the beginning of the year, a parent meeting is hosted with all of our teachers, where we discuss developmental milestones and school readiness tips. This includes education on the importance of attendance and establishing a consistent routine with every child. Every month we provide families with a blank copy of our school calendar, along with stickers to match! Kids can add stickers to their calendar for each day they go to school, and at the end of the month they can turn their calendars in for a small prize. The class with the highest average attendance each month gets a class party with a special treat! At the end of the year, attendance awards are given to a student in each classroom. Their family is also given a small prize to show our appreciation for their effort!

2. Gas cards will be given to families' when needed, especially during times when the bus is not in operation or we have family participation events.

PROGRESS: While we know with the rise in gas prices may cause families to struggle in providing transportation to school or events gas cards has helped ease the financial burden on those in need. When the bus is not in operation we have seen families transporting their children to school who otherwise may have missed the day. We provide those families with gas cards in exchange and have seen attendance boost because of it. Gas cards have also helped families participate in school activities we are seeing a rise in parent participation to Parent Connection Meetings, IEP's and event days on and off campus.

LONG RANGE GOAL: Expose and educate our children, families and staff in Native American traditions to improve cultural enrichment that will last a lifetime.

OBJECTIVES:

 Invite Tribal elders to participate in events, read to the children and share their culture and Native language.

PROGRESS: The Program Manager invites the Tribal Council to events on campus like Stick Horse Rodeo, all holiday activities, and Little Big Time. The Program Manager has also invited Redding Rancheria community members to participate in reading week and family culture and career week.

2. A section on Native American Culture will be added to the teachers weekly lesson plans. PROGRESS: The students began doing Wintu words and learning words in their native languages. They also began singing songs from the Wintu Tribe.



<u>LONG RANGE GOAL</u>: Prioritize nutrition and create a "center of wellness" to encourage healthy eating and activity patterns of children, families, and staff for the purpose of improving life outcomes.

OBJECTIVES:

1. Secure a new food vendor or work with the current one to create healthier meals that are more balanced and snacks for children.

PROGRESS: We have begun moving forward with our food program which will provide healthy meals for students. Our food service worker has begun cooking healthy meals for our students every Friday in preparation for the upcoming school year.

2. Continue to build on our children's garden which can be used for a variety of lessons and healthy cooking activities.

PROGRESS: During construction we will have to remove our garden. Because of this we decided not to plant in our garden this year. Instead we planted vegetables for the kids to take home with their parents during our Week of the Young Child.

2022/2023 REVIEWS & INSPECTIONS

IHS Facility Inspection-

The IHS (Indian Health Services) Environmental Health and Safety Assessment was conducted at the Redding Rancheria Head Start & Child Care by Rinnah Wyatt on September 8, 2022. The facility was found to be well-operated.

Based on survey findings, the program was compliant with health and safety requirements, and has a detailed Safety Plan in response to Covid-19. A few recommendations were made:

- Add internal thermometers to hot hold equipment to ensure proper temperature is reached. Hot hold should only be used to keep food hot once the food has been reheated.
- Order chlorine test strips for dishwasher. Chlorine sanitizer could not be detected
 with a test strip after the dishwasher completed a cycle. Maintenance was called to
 check the lines. Staff was advised to use 3 compartment sinks for
 washing/rinsing/sanitizing until problem was corrected.
- 3. Emergency lighting was not available in classroom 1 and 2. The safety officer corrected the issue on site.

CLASS Review- This year the Redding Rancheria was part of a piolet program which allowed us to complete a self-review. The self-review gave teachers and students the ability to feel comfortable with a familiar face in the classroom during the review. Cassi Lawson-Pigott, the mentor teacher at the Redding Rancheria Head Start and Childcare, did the CLASS review of both Head Start classrooms in March of 2023. Cassi has been working for the Redding Rancheria Head Start for 18 years and has been the mentor teacher for the last 7 years. Cassi reported high quality education and care at our program from a caring staff in a high-quality educational environment.

The CLASS Assessment measures the teaching staff's quality of language and positive adult-child interactions in each classroom. Cassi observed that in each classroom the children were happy, with no extreme challenging behaviors. She also observed that staff and

students were smiling, laughing and learning, engaged in an environment that can only enhance a child's preschool experience and intrinsic sense of self. We are so proud or our teaching staff and the outcome of the CLASS Review.

Additionally, the Redding Rancheria Head Start program budget relies on in-kind support from the Redding Rancheria Tribe and the Redding Rancheria Tribal Health Center to provide the following essential services free of charge:



- Facility rent and maintenance; nightly custodial services and supplies
- Children's health services including: child screening and testing, behavioral health services, nutritional services, and dental services.

Lastly, the Redding Rancheria Head Start program relies on parent and community volunteer services, especially to support the Policy Council and the Health Advisory Committee.

ENROLLMENT

Families interested in the Head Start program must qualify by meeting locally designed requirements. This free program serves federally recognized, Native American children between the ages of three and five years old. We reserve a minimum of 10% of our enrollment spots for children with disabilities. In general eligibility is based on family income at or below the poverty level. Families with other situations including homelessness, children in foster care, receiving temporary assistance are also eligible. 49% of enrolled spots are reserved for Redding Rancheria Tribal Member spots as over-income. In April of 2023 families who are receiving SNAP (CalFresh) qualify for the Head Start program under Public Assistance. Our Child Care Program serves Native American Children from income eligible, working families with locally designed requirements as well as parents who are full time students. This program has a share of cost. Eligible native children ages 0-12 years in our service area, per the 2022 Child Count = 1,628

- 100% of children served are Native American.
- Head Start- <u>32 children</u> and <u>38 families</u> were served.

- 28% of Head Start center based kids achieved a 22/23 year-end attendance more than 85%. Family support was offered for families who were below 85% attendance.

HEALTH & NUTRITION SERVICES

The Head Start emphasizes the importance of early identification of health needs, which, if undetected or left untreated, may cause learning difficulties. The program makes every effort to ensure that our students are connected to a doctor or clinic in order to receive a complete age-appropriate health assessment as recommended by his/her physician. Health screenings are performed throughout the school year and parents are notified when screenings are scheduled and receive copies of the results. Within 45 days from the first day of attendance, all students are screened and assessed in the following areas: Developmental, Behavior, Vision, Hearing, Dental and Nutrition. Head Start and Child Care children receive breakfast, lunch and snack during program hours. Students receive three-quarters of their daily nutritional requirements while attending school.

DISABILITIES & MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

Children with disabilities or mental health concerns are encouraged to participate in program services. Speech and Language services was the most frequently identified special education need. Appropriate accommodations, enhancements, and support is provided as needed for each child. We collaborate with Redding Rancheria Tribal Health center to supply counseling services to our students here at school once a month. This school year there was a significant amount of interest for children to gain access to counseling. Families also typically see a provider additionally at the Health Center.



FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Family engagement is a vital component in the structure and function of the Head Start and Child Care programs. A strong relationship between families and Head Start staff is essential to promoting healthy child development and positive learning outcomes. We value parents in our program and encourage involvement in a variety of ways including, program governance, program planning, curriculum development, child homework, and personal development.

Parent Committee

One of the program's primary goals is to help families participate in their child's education as well as in their own personal growth and development. All of our parents are a part of our "Parent Connection" Parent Committee where monthly education, trainings and resources are



provided. This year the program provided ten parent-child interactive Parent Connection

Meetings with different themes. These workshops provide a great environment where families
can come together to learn and support each other.

Parent Involvement Activities

- 6 Head Start parents were members of the Head Start Policy Council and 3 Child Care parents served as Community Partners.
- 10 "Parent Connection" meetings were held throughout the year, providing opportunities
 for parent education and feedback. These included Kinder Readiness, Nutrition, Self-Care,
 Attendance, Budgeting, Car Seat Safety, Knowing your IEP, Triple P, Harvest Feast, and
 Water/Fire Safety.
- 9 Parent Involvement activities were held during the school year including: Week of the Young Child, Family Culture Week, Mother's Day Tea, Fathers Day Campout, Dad's and Donuts, Moms and Muffins, The Pumpkin Patch, Box Care Build, and Present Wrapping
- Nearly 100% of parents participated in monthly special events including Box Car Race, Stick
 Horse Rodeo and Graduation.


SCHOOL READINESS

Children are assessed three times per year using Teaching Strategies.



CLOSING STATEMENT

Head Start is committed to giving every child, regardless of circumstances at birth, an opportunity to succeed in school and in life. Since its inception, Head Start has improved the lives of more than 32 million children and their families. Head Start is the place where, at an early age, children can acquire a life-long love of learning. The result for those children and



families enrolled is that they became the focus of involved parents and many caring professionals. Children's developmental needs were identified and met; families were assisted in goal setting and managing emergencies. The Redding Rancheria Head Start program provided comprehensive parent education opportunities. On June 8, 2023, 27 students in the Head Start and Child Care successfully moved on to Kindergarten or Transitional Kindergarten.
